## WHAT DOES IT FIND?

- The review identifies a notable decline in narrative reviews (from 11.41% to 7.85%) and a sharp rise in meta-analyses (from 2.33% to 12.88%) after 2000, signaling a shift toward more rigorous and standardised research practices.
- Findings also show that studies involving metaanalysis and author collaboration (p ≤ .001) are linked to more significant citation impact, indicating methodological maturity and growing scholarly influence in AL.

# HOW CAN I USE THE FINDINGS IN MY PRACTICE?

Language teacher training programmes can:

- Highlight the value of secondary research in applied linguistics to inform evidence-based language teaching practices.
- Integrate systematic reviews (e.g., metaanalyses) into training to build research literacy and methodological awareness.
- Foster collaboration and transparency by embedding these principles into classroom discussions and group projects.
- Explore citation trends to help trainees understand the influence of rigorous research on language education.
